PROLOGUE

There is a Navy veteran in St. Catharines, who for several years thought about a reunion of his formers shipmates of the H.M.C.S. Lindsay. He hesitated for some time but was finally pushed into it by his three brothers. During the winter of 89-90 he managed to locate 4-5 shipmates and formed a committee. Using 1945 addresses they started to search Canada for 90 shipmates. They searched from East Apple River, Nova Scotia to Gabriola Island, British Columbia. By August they confirmed that 29 were deceased, they also found 51 of which 40 were able to attend. Illness and other reasons prevent some from attending. The rest, as they say, is history.

SEPTEMBER 2

The scene is the lobby of the Howard Johnson Hotel, St. Catharines. Early in the forenoon committee members are frantically setting up tables for registration and decorating the hospitality room in anticipation. They are about to greet their buddies of 45 years ago. By noon a few people drift into the lobby. A few are recognizable; others took a second look to identify. In a matter of minutes the place is alive with warm greetings and animated conversation. More arrive in the afternoon and the scene shifts to the hospitality room. There is one crew member, known as the piano man, performing his magic on the keyboard. At first the wives seem a little quiet and hesitant, having only just met for the first time. This does not last for long, for you see they all have something in common. They are married to Navy men. As the day shortens up, it becomes obvious that the mood is one of brotherhood, togetherness, and joy. The curtain had been drawn back and the 45 years had disappeared. From B.C. to N.S. and all points in between, the crew was together. There is a good feeling in the air.

SEPTEMBER 3

Early risers all. In groups of 4-5-6, people were getting together for breakfast. Later they spent time comparing notes on such things as children and grandchildren - an exhausting subject. The afternoon was given over to a barbecue and pool party. The weather was perfect. It was here that the chairman's three brothers and their wives along with his own wife demonstrated the complete family support. It was such a good time and a fine party, it was difficult to leave. Back at the hotel, the hospitality room was very much alive. Many congregated around the piano man and sang some dear old Navy tunes. Others mulled over old snapshots and poured over the memorabilia spread out on tables. A few drifted to the lounge - but amazingly, everyone retired about 11-11:30 p.m. Something to do with age no doubt.

SEPTEMBER 4

Following breakfast, all boarded a tour bus for a trip to Niagara Falls. This was a highlight for many, who had never seen this part of Canada. A trip up the Skylon Tower and a trip, on the "Maid of the Mist" added to the thrills.

Luncheon was provided by the R.C.N.A. (Royal Canadian Naval Association) at the Falls Legion, and a sumptuous one it was. In the afternoon a further tour along the Niagara frontier, included the Whirlpool Rapids, the Adam Beck power plant and the floral displays. Upon arriving back at the hotel, it was learned that the Captain's wife and son had arrived from Victoria. It was a great pleasure to meet and welcome such a fine lady. A special Chinese buffet was laid on for supper. This was a favourite for all and proved to be a successful gathering. Later at the hotel, the conversations were heavy with nostalgia, and talk of other times and missing shipmates. Again at a relatively early hour - most drifted off to retire and prepare for Day IV.

SEPTEMBER 5

Again an early departure by tour bus. Today it was the Welland Canal. This brought back memories (for most) of November 1943. It was at that time that this crew brought their brand new ship through the locks, on their way to the North Atlantic. Everyone was amazed at the sight of a large upper lake bulk carrier, as it proceeded through a lock. Lunch was provided by the Legion at Port Dalhousie, site of the first lock of the first Welland Canal. The present canal is the fourth. Back at the hotel in the early afternoon, everyone prepared to dress up for the official reunion dinner. This was both a happy and a solemn affair. Happy because they were all together, enjoying the company of dear friends and solemn, inasmuch as a special tribute was paid to the departed and missing shipmates. Dancing followed and of course the inevitable late night conversations in small groups in the ever popular hospitality room. Day V was just around the corner.

SEPTEMBER 6

Another early start by bus. A tour of a large vineyard was scheduled. This was an interesting tour. The size of the farm, the magnitude of the operation and the many products produced, astounded everyone. This was followed by a tour of the largest winery in Canada, "Brights". It was shown how the grapes are processed and the wine bottled and shipped. A wine tasting with cheese completed the afternoon. Upon returning to the hotel, everyone was a little worn from the pace of the week, and they drifted off in groups for dinner and later to the hospitality room. The committee were busy packing the decorations, preparing for the trip to Lindsay, the following morning. Everyone retired earlier than usual.

SEPTEMBER 8

Everyone was on deck, lashed and stowed for a 0800 departure. A convoy of about 18 cars and vans moved out for Lindsay. Arriving about 11:00 a.m. at their motel, the group prepared to go to lunch at the OK restaurant. The afternoon was free to tour the lovely town on the Scugog River. By 6:00 p.m. all were gathered at the Lindsay Legion, where a formal dinner was tendered by the town. Several guests and dignitaries were present, in addition to the mayor and town council. The mayor expressed the town's gratitude to the crew of the Lindsay who served proudly in the name of the town. All retired to the motel at an early hour. Voices were muted as each said good night knowing that on the morrow it would be good-bye.

SEPTEMBER 9

No doubt the most emotional, part of the week - how to say good-bye? It was said in many forms. A hug, a firm handshake - a kiss - and yes more than a few tears. Would they ever get together again? Highly unlikely! Certainly some would be visiting with others during their travels. As a group, however, this crew knew in their hearts, that this was the last they would ever be together.

EPILOGUE

Letters started to arrive to the committee within days. Shipmates had indeed enjoyed the week. Some expressions in these notes were "better than could be expected", "wouldn't have missed it for the world", "how did you do it?" The committee had a meeting - like a post mortem. The adrenalin was still flowing, however - bills had to be paid - borrowed equipment returned and many little things settled. They were a happy group, however, and all the credit would have to be directed to the chairman. He had pulled us together and pulled off a reunion, successful beyond his dreams.

If you enjoyed the week, please - let the chairman know, if you haven't already done so.
