THE SHIP'S BADGE

BLAZON: Vert, a Bend wavy Argent charged with two like Cotisses Bendlets Azure, debruised with a Sun in Splendour on which is charged with a Beaver Sable.

SIGNIFICANCE: HMCS GATINEAU takes her name from the Gatineau River in the Province of Quebec. It rises near the headwaters of the St. Maurice River and flows in a westerly direction before turning south to join the Ottawa River a short distance below the City of Hull, and across from Ottawa, the Canadian Capital. Most authorities agree that the Gatineau River took its name from one Nicolas Gatineau or Gastineau, a notary, civic official and fur-trader of Three Rivers. It is presumed that he lost his life by drowning about 1683 during one of the fur-trading expeditions down the Riviere duNord(the present Gatineau), and henceforth his name began to be applied to this river and district.

The wavy white and blue diagonal stripe refers to the Gatineau River. The green background to the forests and recreational areas of the Valley. The Sun, is depicted in the badge in reference to the fact that annually thousands of city-dwellers hie of to the hills, lakes and streams of the Gatineau River Valley to enjoy the sunshine and outdoor life. The little black beaver is in tribute to Mr. Nicolas Gatineau and his fur-trading activities.



HMCS GATINEAU POST-REFIT RE-ACTIVATION

HMCS GATINEAU recently completed a thorough DELEX (Destroyer Life Extension) refit by Ship Repair Unit (Pacific), and the ceremony today marks her return to the fleet. This programme includes information about the ship and the ceremony.

In the weeks to come the ship will carry out trials to ensure that all of her systems are ready for operational service. She will then conduct work-up training to exercise her ship's company at working as a team. After this, HMCS GATINEAU will be ready to join the Second Canadian Destroyer Squadron in an operational role.

THE DELEX REFIT

HMCS GATINEAU is the first West Coast ship to complete a Destroyer Life Extension (DELEX) refit. The refit, which began on the 22nd of September, 1981, was conducted by Ship Repair Unit (Pacific). Portions of the refit were also contracted out to Burrard Yarrows Corporation.

In addition to the thorough overhaul which is part of every refit, many alterations and changes have been carried out on the ship which will significantly enhance her operational capability.

The external changes include:

- -removal of her 10.3 cm Rocket Flare Launcher and the installation of a new chaff system known as SRBOC. (Gatineau will be the first operational Canadian ship to be fitted with this system);
- -removal of her old Sperry navigation radar and its replacement by the Mkl27E navigation radar;
- -removal of the top of her lattice mast and its replacement by the pole mast which is also presently fitted in HMCS TERRA NOVA.

The internal changes are even greater, and include; -solid stating of much of her electronics;

- -a completely remodeled Operations Room;

 The most significant addition is the Automated Data Link Plotting System (ADLIPS). Gatineau is the first West Coast ship to receive the ADLIPS system, which was designed by Litton of Canada. With its computer this system will plot and process much of the information which in previous years had been handled manually. ADLIPS will also communicate or "link" with other ship's computer systems and exchange data on surface, air and sub-surface contacts.
- -a completely redone Message Center and Communications Control Room (CCR);
- -a larger and more powerful diesel generator for harbour power;
- -new evaporators or "vaps" which will provide the ship with a better source of fresh water; and $\,$

-a habitability package which will include modifications to her galley,wardroom pantry and laundry room.

During the year long refit, Gatineau personnel busy doing training afloat and ashore in a number of ship's and establishments. Some have been employed alongside SRU(P) assisting with the refit of their ship. Many new personnel have joined the ship since the refit began. Today the ship's company have been brought together to man their ship.

THE HERITAGE

HMCS GATINEAU takes her name from the Gatineau River in Eastern Quebec. She is the second Canadian warship to bear the name.

The first Gatineau, an ex-Royal Navy destroyer, entered service with the Royal Canadian Navy in 1943. She was involved with convoy duties in the Atlantic and was part of the support group for the Normandy landings. In 1946 she was paid off, leaving her battle honours to this Gatineau:

"Atlantic 1943 - 1944"

"Normandy 1944"

The present Gatineau was laid down at Davie Shipbuilding Lt., Lauzon, P.Q., on Aprial 30, 1953, and was launched on June 4, 1957. Her sponsor was Mrs. H.N. Lay, wife of Rear Admiral H.N. Lay, OBE, CD, RCN (Ret'd), at that time Vice Chief of the Naval Staff. On December 15, 1958, the Gatineau was taken in tow by the Foundation Maritime tug Vigilant and moved from Lauzon to Halifax to avoid the freeze-up in the St. Lawrence River. HMCS Gatineau was commissioned at HMC Dockyard, Halifax, N.S., on February 17, 1959

Gatineau spent all her service, prior to her first conversion in 1969, as a unit of the Fifth Canadian Escort (Barber Pole) Squadron based in Halifax, Nova Scotia. On August 14, 1969, she arrived at CFB Esquimalt, Victoria, BC., where she underwent a mid-life conversion

The conversion was carried out over the period 1969 - 1971. The conversion program introduced advances in electronics for the design and construction of sonar, fire control computer and weapon delivery systems. This, together with electronic warfare and

communications improvements, necessitated major hull changes. The Gatineau was one of four ships of the "Restigouche" class to undergo conversion

The Gatineau has an overall length of 377 feet, a beam of 42 feet, and a mean draught of 13.4 feet, and her displacement is 2,700 tons.

SHIP REPAIR UNIT (PACIFIC)

Ship Repair Unit (Pacific) (SRU(P)) has been responsible for many of the refits conducted in Esquimalt. The 1981/82 refit of HMCS GATINEAU was a special challenge to SRU(P). Not only was it the first in-house zero-manned refit, but it also contained the most comprehensive DELEX package installed to date. Many DELEX items are a first in Canadian steam destroyers and the installations required much ad hoc on-site engineering. That some of the installations were even attempted is due not only to the efforts of the SRU(P) workforce, but also to the extroardinary outputs of the Naval Engineering Unit Pacific, Project Manager DELEX and other NDHQ Directorates, GATINEAU's Engineering Department and all the other myriad of people and organizations whose cooperation is so essential.

This refit has set a fitting example for all future DELEX refits.
