Dear Mr. and Mrs. Mahoney:

You are perhaps anaware of the fate of your son Jack, who lost his life between April 29th and May 1st, 1944, while a member of the crew of the "Athabaska". At that time I and one of my comrades were stationed in the fishing village of Ponquel (?), near Pionescat in Brittany, France. On that night there was an explosion on the destroyer, which probably had struck a mine, and on the next day I and my comrade, Erich Gossmann, and a number of French fishermen and a member of the French goastguard, Gilbert by name, picked up some bodies which we buried in the Plonescat cemebery. The identifications tags and valuables, including wallets found on the bodies, were transmitted to the customs station at Morlaix from where they were surrendered to the Red Cross. At least that is what was supposed to be done but at that time the French railway stations were under heavy bombardment and the effects may have been lost.

I would have written to you before this but I myself have been a prisoner of war since August 1944 and was released only a short while ago. I hope that this information will be of some use to you. Should you be interested in obtaining further particulars, please write.

Dear Sir:

These Headquarters have received an inquiry on behalf of the mother of the above-noted deceased Officer, respecting the location of his grave and place of burial.

It will be noted that there has been previous correspondence with the mother, Mrs. A. Mahoney, 156 King St. E., Toronto, by which we note that this Officer lost his life in the sinking of H.M.C.S. ATHABASKAN, along with a large number of other Naval personnel, and that the mother received a communication from a German ex-P.O.W., Wilhelm Ehnes. This man stated that he and other comrades had recovered several bodies at that time, including the above-noted, and is reported to have buried them in Plouescat Cemetery, near the village of Ponquel, Brittany, France.

However, the point is, would you kindly advise whether any further information has been obtained, such as the proper identification of this body and whether same has been disinterred and reburied in a Canadian cemetery.

Appreciating any further word you may have on this subject. I am, Sir.

Shortly after the sinking of H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN", bodies from this ship were recovered and buried along the coast of Finistere, France, at Brignogan, Plouescat, Santec and L'Aberwrach. France at that time was under German occupation and in most cases all positive means of identification were taken from the bodies by the Germans. The citizens of the above mentioned French towns looked after the burials and held funeral services.

The Army Graves Services, Overseas, have, since the cessation of hostilities, been making searches on the Continent in an effort to locate graves and identify bodies and have forwarded to Naval Headquarters exhumation reports, dental records, etc., of casualties from H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN" with a view to definitely establishing the identity of bodies which they have exhumed and over whose graves they have erected temporary markers.

with the above mentioned documents was enclosed a medal which was found on one of the bodies. A photograph of it is attached and it would be appreciated if you would inform Naval Headquarters as to whether or not you can identify this medal as belonging to your late son.

All available dental data which was received with the exhumation reports was compared with the dental particulars on your son's file at Naval Headquarters but no positive identification was made.

Should you confirm that the medal was the property of your late son, Grave Number 30, Row "B", Plot Number one, in the Plouescat Communal Cemetery, Plouescat, Finistere, France, will be accepted as being that of Lieutenant Mahoney.

With reference to your submission of the 26th of September, 1947, attached is the original letter, envelope and a translation of the letter received from Mrs. A. Mahoney, mother of the deceased.

- No information has been received that a grave has been located for the above-named, but efforts are still being made by the Canadian Naval Authorities Overseas in conjunction with the Director of Graves Registration and Enquiries, London, England, and Units of this Directorate on the Continent to locate the graves of Canadian Naval personnel who lost their lives in the European theatre of war. Any news is immediately passed on to the next-of-kin concerned.
- that along the coast of Finistere, France, at Brignogan, Plouescat, Santec and L'Aberwrach, shortly after the sinking of H.M.C.S. "ATHABASKAN", bodies from this ship were recovered and buried. Of approximately seventy bodies known to have been recovered in this region, only three, however, were definitely identified. In many cases all positive means of identification were taken from the bodies by the Germans, who are known to have later used the data so obtained, in the interrogation of prisoners of war from the ship. In this connection also it is pointed out that the Department does not accept personal effects and clothing found on bodies as a positive meansof identification as it is feasible that during the emergency that existed at the time that articles of clothing may have been worn by members of the crew other than the owners.
- 4. It is understood that the citizens of the abovementioned French towns looked after the burials and held funeral services, even against the wishes of the Germans.
- 5. The War Office, London, expects that the bodies of Canadians will in due course all be disinterred and re-buried in proper consecrated Canadian Cemeteries on the Continent. It may be possible at that time to definitely identify some of the remains now buried as unidentified by means of dental charts and physical particulars available at present in the Department.

6. The next-of-kin of the late Lieutenant Mahoney will be informed immediately any further news respecting him is received.

Receipt is acknowledged of your letter of 24th June, 1948, concerning the late Lieutenent Maloney. R.C.N.V.R.

For your information, the Army Graves Service. London, operating under the War Office is responsible for tracing of graves of all British Commonwealth servicemen. Our Naval Liaison Officer in London is informed as soon as any information is obtained regarding Canadian Naval personnel buried on the continent. Any such information obtained is always passed on immediately to the next of kin.

It is known that up to 70 bodies from H.M.C.S.
"ATHABASKAN" were buried on the coast of France, near
Brignonan, Plouescat, Santec and L'Aberwrach shortly after
the ship was lost. Of these, only three have been positively
identified to date.

In regard to establishing the definite identity of bodies, the following points should be noted;

- (a) Articles of clothing, lifebelts and personal effects do not necessarily constitute positive identification, as it is possible that in the emergency that existed at the time of the action, such articles might have been worn by persons other than the owner.
- (b) Burials were in the majority of cases under the supervision of the Germans who were in the habit of stripping bodies of personal effects.

In the case of Lieutenant Mahoney, a copy of the letter which his mother received from Wilhelm Manes who claims to be a German ex-prisoner of war, was forwarded to our London office for transmission to the Army Graves Service for possible further investigation. To date, no report has been received whether any trace has been established through this letter, but a further inquiry has been made. You may be assured that Mrs. Mahoney will be advised as soon as any definite information is received.

Mone of the bodies of the Athabaskan casualties which were buried on the Coast of France have as yet been disinterred and reburied in a Canadian cemetery.

#### Missing on Athabaskan

## German Letters Tell Of 60 Canadian Tars Buried on French Soil

Just what happened after the sinking of the HMCS Athabaskan on April 29, 1944, is puzzling a To-ronto mother who recently received four letters from a German who

claims to have buried her son. Lieut. Jack Mahoney, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Mahoney of 156 King St. E., was listed missing, and later presumed dead, after the Athabas-kan went down. Lieut. Mahoney, formerly a staff photographer on The Globe and Mail, served as a photographic officer with the RCN.
After reading the letters from

the German, who might have been either in the German army or working with French underground forces, Mrs. Mahoney is confronted with a mystery. Did her son reach the French coast alive, or did he drown when the ship sank? Why did the German delay so long in writing, and what were his motives? Is there a story about the sinking of the Athabaskan that has not yet been revealed?

The first letter, in German, came from Wilhelm Ehnes, Schramber-gerstr, 54, Rottweil, Wurttemberg, in the American zone, and told of

the sinking. He wrote:
"About that time I was ordered,
with my comrades, to a little German service post in the fishing village of Possquen near Plouescat, in Brittany. That same night the de-stroyer Athabaskan blew up, having probably run into a mine. On the following day, with my comrade, Erich Gassmann, some French fishermen and also the Garde Mari-time of Plouescat, I took the dead to a place of safety, and also made sure they were buried in the cemetery."

He mentions identification tags, pocketbooks and other valuables being sent to the customs office Morlaix to be handed over to the Red Cross Service Post, This might not have been done because of heavy bombing at the time, he
