
May we add that now we are back to our home port, we can use the same understanding, patience and tolerance in our homes as was necessary in our ship.

265 miles of sounding lines were run by the ship's boats in sounding Resolute Harbour and Alexandra Fiord. 7280 miles of sounding lines were run by the ship.

### METEOROLOGY:

Ship was north of the Arctic Circle for 55 days, 28July to 20 September. Average air temperature: 37.2 degrees F.

Lowest temperature experienced 24F - off Point Barrow.

Highest temperature experienced 56F - at Alexandra Fiord

Of the 55 days, 13 were sunny and 42 cloudy.

Visibility was below one mile in fog for 231 hours, or 18% of the time.

The ceiling was below 1000 feet 39% of the time.

Average wind speed: 11.7 knots.

Rain, snow or drizzle occurred on 30 out of the 55 days.

### MAGNETIC:


10 magnetic observations were made, each observation taking anywhere from 12 to 30 hours to complete. 15 gyro-magnetic trials were carried out.



### HELICOPTERS:

During the cruise the helicopters have flown 220 miles and have carried in excess of 300 passengers. Among the passengers carried were:
Mounted Police, Eskimos, Venture Cadets, Captains, a Colonial Governor, Personnel of this ship, Hydrographers, the Loomer Expedition and the Commander. About 50% of the flying in the North was for Ice Reconnaissance; other operations included, guiding the landing craft into the beaches through heavy ice, flying the mail, VIP ferry, searching for Monte Carlo, transporting the Loomer expedition, giving assistance to North Wind, photographic work, and terrorizing the natives of Mexico. They also carried, beacons, a kyak, a sled, survivors, mail and the Commander.

### SHOOTING A LINE

of all the diverse recreations enjoyed by the members of the Ship's company during our extended cruise, there was none which afforded more amusement than the LABRADOR Skeet Shoot. This differed from the normal land-bound sport both in the selection of targets, and in the variety of weapons employed, while the only rule enforced was that which stated that Section 118 would be invoked to deal with any competitor found shooting closer than one centimetre from his neighbours ears. Of the location, it can be said that the quarterdeck of a ship moving through the Tropics at ten knots, with a beam wind and sea, and bright sunlight provides an interestingly different gun-platform, involving a sense of balance and timing that would do credit to a high-wire walker. These bobbing, bouncing bladders proved to be quite difficult to hit, and only the surest of eyes, allied to the clearest of consciences was good enough to evoke the soul-satisfying sound of the sudden release of pressure from a bursting bladder,

The bark of a 45, the crack of a 38, and the pops from the 22's combined at times into a concerto of small-arms fire, and the pm prodigatious expenditure of munitions was exceeded only by the obvious high hopes and expectations of marksmanship of the expenders.
