Small Boat Which Sank in High Sea Off Partridge Island Reported Now Raised to Surface. With One in Cabin

5 BELIEVED HURLED INTO WATER

Rescue Attempts Said Made, But to No Avail; Not Known Whether Grappling Begun; Official Statement By Naval Authorities Not Yet Available

AN IMMEDIATE enquiry into what was Saint John Harbor's worst tragedy in the last 50 years—the drowning of six Can-dian Navy personnel aboard a small harbor patrol craft which apsized and sank off Partridge Island yesterday afternoonwill be launched, according to unofficial information gathered by The Evening Times-Globe today. While enquiries into any accident, slight or serious, are a routine formality with the ned forces, this probe will have special significance in view the great loss of life.

No official announcement was available today from naval authorities here, or headquarters in Ottawa, but it is presumed that the errand on which the boat was sent yesterday-in seas which made even barbor veterans wince-must have been aighly important.

The patrol craft carrying the six navy men was similar to a good-sized motorboat, approximately 45 feet long, it was udged, with a cabin or wheelhouse rising from the deck.

BOAT RAISED? BODY FOUND?

It was reported today that the boat, which apparently sank oon after it capsized, was raised today, near the scene of the ccident, and with it, trapped in the cabin, was said to have een found the body of the Skipper H. R. Wamback. Wamack, of the R.C.N.R., coming here from Lunenburg, N.S., esided on Horsfield Street. He is survived by his wife and a mall son, in Nova Scotia.

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RELATIVES ADVISED

The navy's hesitancy in making an official announcement pparently hinged—as is the usual practice—on the possibility hat all relatives of the victims may not yet have received the avy's formal notification of their deaths. However, such otification was either delivered personally, in the cases of the elatives residing in Saint John, or sent by telegraph to relatives n outside points early last evening, it is understood.

With lack of official information it was not known this afteroon whether grappling operations had been begun and, if so, odies other than Wamback's had been recovered.

It was said today that normally this boat carried a crew of ven but that one of the personnel was unable to make the rip yesterday, having to remain behind to receive medical eatment for a cut finger.

RESCUE SAID ATTEMPTED

Another unconfirmed report was that an as yet unidentied boat, the crew of which witnessed the accident, attempted o reach the scene and even managed to throw a line to one r more of the men struggling in the water but, on account of he seas and danger of that spot to the rescue craft, was unable o get sufficiently close.

Cause of the tragedy was, apparently, the drenching of he boat's engine by a huge wave, this putting the engine out of commission and leaving the craft helpless. With the boat aught in the trough of the waves, the next roller presumably level it over as a cat would a mouse, leaving the little vessel from up. Evidently those men pitched into the high, freezng seas were unable to get back to the boat or, if they did sanage to do that, hang on. Last night the whereabouts of he boat was unknown, although one report was to the effect hat it was last seen drifting south toward the open Bay of This morning's report, also unofficial, would indicate hat it sank, and fairly near the scene of its capsizing.

In addition to the administration of those Service assets, the Administrator of Estates is authorized to withdraw into Government account any funds (within a defined amount) on deposit to the deceased's credit in Banks, Post Offices or other financial institutions in Canada and Overseas, without expense or trouble to the person(s) legally entitled to the estate, and to distribute such funds at the same time as any balance of pay is distributed. Also, War Savings Certificates and Victory Loan' Bonds owned by the deceased may be redeemed and similarly distributed, or transmitted into the name(s) of the person(s) legally entitled. Such Certificates and Bonds should not be forwarded to the Administrator of Estates until they are requested.

If there are other assets which necessitate an application for Probate or Letters of Administration, the Administrator of Estates may transfer and hand over the Service assets to the executor or administrator appointed by the Court so that all the estate, Service and otherwise, may be dealt with as a whole.

The information given by you on Pages 2 and 3 of this form is therefore of importance in determining whether or not the deceased's assets are such that they may all be administered by the Administrator of Estates to the person(s) legally entitled, that is, without the need for Probate or Administration.


