- 1. Following instructions relate to Naval celebrations of end of hostilities in Europe.
- 2. Definition of terms used:
 VE-DAY. Homewaters. Day on which Prime Minister announces end of hostilitèes. Abroad. Day selected by local civil governments. Similar announcement.

 THANKSGIVING SUNDAY. In U.K. First Sunday after Ve-Day or, if latter falls later than Thursday, second Sunday.
- 3. Local celebrations. Home Office have sent to local authorities circular number 97 dated 30th April on arrangements for celebrations of termination of hostilities in Europe, and are supplying copies to the press and B.B.C. Admiralty hope to send copies to addressees at Home.
- 4. General instructions on Naval celebrations. Requirements of

operations, essential maintenance and essential training come first. Their Lordships are anxious that official Naval celebrations should be modest and coupled with full recognition of tasks still to be completed in the Far East. Commanders in Chief should exercise their discretion in applying detailed instructions below.

- 5. Routine on Ve-Day. Ships companies should be piped down after divisions. Special instructions are being issued about leave.
- 6. Dressing ship. H.M. Ships in port should dress with masthead flags on Ve-Day and Ve plus one from time of announcement of referred to in para. 2 (A).
- 7. Iluminations If the coastal lighting restrictions have been relaxed H.M.Ships in harbour may assist n local illumination on Ve-Day or Ve plus one.



- 8. Special meals. No special meals to be provided.
- 9. Special parades. Between Ve-Day and thanksgiving Sunday, both dates inclusive, Commanders in Chief may arrange special parades both purely Naval and in conjunction with other services as they consider appropriate. Naval units may also participate in ceremonies arranged by local authorities.
 In deciding between competing claims Commanders in Chief should generally give preference to those localities with Naval associations. Admiralty will issue special insturctions concerning Naval participation in national ceremonies on thanksgiving Sunday.
- 10. Foreign ports. Arrangements will be at the discretion of Commanders in Chief or Senior Naval officer present in consultation with local authorities.

The German High Command has surrendered unconditionally all German land, sea and air forces in Europe, effective from 0001B hours 9th May from which hour all offensive operations are to cease.

Due to difficulties of communication there may be some delay in these orders reaching enemy forces. Accordingly, danger of attack by individual enemy surface craft, U-Boats and aircraft may persist for some time to come, The Fleet in all waters is to remain on a warfare footing and freighters a state of constant vigilance for the moment.

Surrender procedure for U-Boats will be promulgated separately. No release is to be made to the press pending an announcement by heads of Government.
