FINDINGS OF THE BOARD

Having heard the evidence, the Board is of the opinion:

1. That the rating's death was immediately caused by pneumonia which had set in as a result of an accident on board H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK" on the 8th day of December, 1944, at approximately 1415 local time, when the rating struck his head on the deck of that ship while vaulting across the well deck bulwarks from H.M.C.S. "BATTLEFORD" to H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK".
2. That everything possible was done for this rating, both medically and surgically.
3. That there was evidence that the rating had consumed alcoholic beverage at sometime unknown prior to the accident wherein he struck his head, although the evidence does not support a finding of the quantity of the beverage consumed nor to what degree the consumption affected his sobriety.
4. That the rating's death was attributable to Naval Service as such in as much as the accident which resulted directly in his death was received on board H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK" while the rating was on active duty.

Xray: 9/12/44.

This patient was admitted for Xray investigation of the skull in a comatose condition. He was completely uncooperative and a large number of films made were spoiled and useless for diagnosis.

Finally after a second attempt some radiographs were made, but these two are not very good, due to the fact the patient was moving and could not cooperate by holding his breath.

A set of right lateral stereoscopic and a single A.P. film of reasonably good bony detail was obtained.

I do not see any evidence of fracture of any of these three radiographs. The pineal gland is not calcified and therefore cannot be seen. The sella turcica is normal.

Summary: Xray investigation of the skull is unsatisfactory. In so far as it is possible to determine, no fracture is visualized.

Xray: 11/12/44. Chest: Single A.P. projection of the chest with the patient in bed. The present film shows mottled density extending throughout the right lung field. This has the appearance of a bronchopneumonia involving both the upper and lower lobes. Nothing definitely abnormal is noted in the left lung field.

Burr hole and removal of clot.

Usual vertical incision, perpendicular to a point midway between external auditory canal and external $\frac{1}{2}$ angle of left eye. Temporal muscle split and bone exposed subperiosteally. Burr hole at mid point of incision with exposure of black clot extra-dural. The hemorrhage was very extensive and there was a terrific amount of old black blood clot with very free bleeding on removal. The opening was enlarged to about 10 cm by 6 cm and two bleeding points were controlled in middle meningeal, one at either upper and lower extremities of wound, both by coagulation after clamping. Very little bleeding on closure.

One penrose drain. Condition improved.

Breathing is somewhat easier, but still has periods of hyperventilation and attacks of extensor rigidity, although not as frequently. Temperature is down to nearly 102 and pulse 80. On the whole I think he is improved. On examination of chest, movement equal, no dullness, but moderate rales at both bases, probably stasis as a cause.

1400. Patient taken out of O₂ tent and O₂ given by nasal catheter since 1000 today. Breathing seems somewhat easier, but still hyperventilating and having slightly fewer attacks of extensor rigidity. Right side still shows paresis. He is receiving G.S. 5% I.V. and as a prophylactic measure is being given penicillin 10,000 units q 2 h, I.V. Dressing change, not much oozing. T. ranging about 103. 2030. Not much change since this afternoon. Temperature has increased to 104° per rectum. Pulse is variable, still hyperventilating, and having attacks of extensor rigidity. Pupils still equal and react to light. The question now is how much cerebral oedema has to do with his condition and how much is due to cerebral dysfunction due to previous brain damage by pressure or direct trauma. He is receiving slow drip of 10% glucose. CO₂ combining power is approximately normal. He has had 100 cc of 50% glucose. This does not seem to help him and on consultation is being discontinued.

12/12/44. I think there is improvement today, although not marked. T. 102 pulse variable between 80-100, but mostly in vicinity of 80. B.P. ranging fairly steady at 140/70. Respirations are rapid, but quite steady and he does not seem to be hyperventilating as much as he was yesterday. He is not having nearly as many extensor attacks, and those that do occur are only mild. Physical examination is otherwise unchanged. 1630 . This is a very puzzling case. There are no external signs of injury whatever. There is doubtful evidence of hemorrhage into left middle ear, but this is not agreed upon by everyone who has seen him.

We have been unable to check the history carefully, but as far as is known this lad was perfectly well until yesterday, when while crossing from one ship to another he tripped, fell and struck his head (manner in which he fell unknown). Brought to Sick Bay apparently semi-conscious, odour of alcohol on his breath. Sent to hospital and course until now as in previous notes.

An interesting and peculiar feature is that he is a L/Sto. who wears a mustache, why?

This P.M. he began to have a rising temperature 101 to 103 by rectum. Pulse from 120 to 180. Cheyne Stokes inspirations, periods of profuse sweating, mostly from head and face. At present he is not exhibiting sign of extensor rigidity as he was this morning. Still has bilateral Babinski response and lack of movement to painful stimuli of right leg and arm. Respirations are labored posturing relieves mucous obstruction. Pupils do not react to light and accommodation, there are dissociated eye movements and the left eye seems limited in its range, does not move outward as right does.

Fundi - both discs are visible; nasal margins blurred but temporal margins clear. Veins are moderately engorged, physiological cupping is almost gone. No retinal hemorrhages were seen. There is no neck rigidity.

The diagnosis here is still obscure. There are no external evidences of injury. Blood sugar and N.P.N. are normal. Urine is clear. Blood workup. Xrays of skull, negative. Lumbar puncture shows moderate number of r.b.c.s increasing from 16,000 cu/mm to 28,000/cu mm in 3 specimens.

There are only a few possibilities here -

- (1) Trauma with intracranial hemorrhage cannot be ruled out entirely but without any sign whatever of external injury it is doubtful this is the primary factor.
- (2) Subarachoid hemorrhage (spontaneous) could be considered. However the number of r.b.c.s in C.S.F. is too few to account for the prolonged and increasing coma.
- (3) Intracerebral haemorrhage as a traumatic or some other basis has to be thought of, however if so why are signs bilateral in lower only, with only few signs in upper extremity, and what is etiology?
- (4) Haemorrhage into midbrain - etiology? This might explain the eye and pyramidal signs to a certain degree, the respiratory changes. What is etiology?

Investigation & Treatment:

- (1) Complete blood work up
- (2) Blood culture
- (3) Careful check of B.P., pulse, Temp., pupils, etc.
- (4) Oxygen tent
- (5) Clear airway
- (6) Check on history

On the whole a policy of wait and watch !

Story of Messmate re Accident:

Rating was jumping across from one ship to his own at 1415, and on attempting to vault the rail his foot caught in a rope, and tripped him. He fell about four feet and landed on the back of his head on the steel deck. He was immediately unconscious, and remained so for approximately one hour. He was then taken out to ambulance, and on reaching fresh air regained consciousness, stated that he was alright, recognized people by their proper names and with help walked across one ship to jetty. Taken by ambulance to Sick Bay, where he complained of severe pain in back of his head, and lapsed into a semi comatose state at about 1600-1630. Admitted to hospital and about 1700 was irrational, restless, irritable. Taken to room and condition has progressed since as in notes. Past History: No complaints whatever. Has done some amateur boxing, last match about two months ago, when he was not knocked down. He has done a moderate amount of amateur boxing.

9/12/44. 1830. History above has been obtained from an eye-witness of the accident, and a messmate who is a close friend. This has been found to prove the fact that there was an accident, and also the fact that there was a period of unconsciousness followed by a lucid interval, followed later by lapsing into coma and progression. Subsequent course is that described previously. Condition has remained about stationary for least two hours. Seen by medical consultant in consultation. We will watch him closely.

2200. Patient's condition has deteriorated. There are periods of hyperventilation, alternating with periods of shallow breathing, moderate Cheyne-Stokes. Pupils are still equal, fixed, dissociated movements. There are frequent attacks of hyperextension and rigidity suggestive of the decerebrate type. Pulse is increasing, up to 140 and more, and temperature is rising, now 104° or better. Surgical consultant has seen patient, and in view of the history and the signs of progression, thinks it advisable to do a craniotomy. The side of choice is left, I think, because of the left sided paresis. The pupils are of no help in this case. Patient is going to O.R. when ready.

1200. Scalp has been shaved. On examination now there is a diffuse ecchymosis over a large portion of the scalp, in the parieto-occipital region, bilaterally. This is not oedematous and, on palpation does not differ from the remaining portion of the scalp. This is the only sign of external injury.

0100. Left temporal craniotomy done with burr and enlarged with rongeur. A large extradural collection of clotted blood encountered. On removal, heavy bleeding beneath skull in lower temporal region. More bone removed, and source revealed as middle meningeal artery lying in and on the dura. This was partially stopped by clamp, which was then cauterized and bleeding ceased. Smaller bleeding points were encountered at upper end, more bone cut away, and these too were stopped with cautery. Patient returned to ward at 0330 in fair condition.

10/12/44. 1000. Condition much the same this A.M. T. is 104. Pulse variable at 140, pupils fixed, marked hyperventilation, and frequent attacks suggestive of decerebrate rigidity. B.P. fairly steady at 140/70. On the whole, his condition is no worse. He had a blood transfusion of 500 cc last night and now receiving G.S. 5% by slow I.V. drip. He is in O₂ tent.

1400. Given 50% dextrose solution 100 cc I.V. Not much change.

2300. Examination tonight reveals both pupils to be somewhat larger than previously and react to light. There is not much change otherwise. Still hyperventilating. B.P. steady. No oozing from dressing. 50cc of 50% dextrose I.V. and this will be repeated in about one hour.

11/12/44. 0900. Still comatose, responds with movement of right side to painful stimuli. Pupils both react to light. There is still a paresis of the right side. Eyes are rolling from side to side.

Death 1000 hours December 17th, 1944.

Autopsy done 11 hours after death.

The body was that of a well-developed, muscular male of about the stated age. Post mortem rigidity was present and the dependent portions of the skin were coloured with post mortem lividity. There were no marks of external violence. The scalp had been shaved and over the left lateral portion there was a clean sutured incision measuring 8 cms. in length.

Opening the Thorax

The thoracic organs were in their normal position and relationships. There was a well defined mass of thymus tissue over the anterior mediastinum. The pericardial cavity was lined by smooth, moist, shining pericardium and contained a normal amount of clear straw-coloured pericardial fluid. The mediastinum was not shifted. The left pleural space was free of fluid and the pleural surfaces were smooth. The pleura over the right middle and lower lobes had a glazed appearance and was covered with scattered yellowish tags of fibrinopurulent exudate. Similar exudate filled the fissure between middle and lower lobes. On separation of the lungs through the hilus the large bronchial trunks from both lungs was found to be filled with yellowish, frothy, sticky mucopurulent exudate. A culture was taken from the right bronchus.

Opening the Abdomen

The peritoneal cavity was free from fluid or exudate and the surfaces were smooth, moist and glistening. The organs lay in normal relative positions.

Opening the Cranium

A recent trephine was present. Slight old haematoma extended beneath the scalp posteriorly from the site of the operation. The muscle of this side was also infiltrated with old haemorrhage.

On removal of the skull cap, there was seen to be a mass of dark clotted blood, extradurally adherent both to the dura and the periosteum of the inner portion of the cranial cavity. The clotted blood covered parts of the squamous and petrous portions of the temporal bones and the parietal bone end lay over adjacent portions of temporal, frontal and parietal lobes. There was no evidence of recent haemorrhage.

On removing the brain, the medulla and adjacent portion of cerebellum was seen to have herniated into the foramen magnum forming the typical cone-like deformity. There were several subpial haemorrhage, with adjacent brain softening. These were noted on the inferior surfaces of both frontal lobes, towards the poles; on the inferior surfaces of the right temporal lobe and at the tip of the right pole; on the lateral aspect of the brain, in the region of the post-cerebral gyrus. Surrounding the old dark haemorrhage were areas of yellowish discolouration indicating age of the damage.

The brain was removed and placed in formalin for fixture before cutting.

The pituitary was removed. The pituitary fossa was normal. There was no evidence of fracture.

The Lungs

The lungs were heavy and both lower lobes, including the right middle lobe, and the lower portion of the upper lobes were lumpy in consistency with very little air-containing tissue remaining. The pleural surfaces over the solid areas were dark red and congested in appearance.

On incision the lungs had a solid meaty consistency and the cut surfaces were dark red and congested interspersed with small solid greyish-white areas which were semi-confluent on the right side. The cut ends of the small bronchii and bronchioles exuded beads of light greenish pus. The larger bronchii contained yellowish frothy mucopurulent exudate.

The pulmonary veins and arteries were normal.

The mediastinal and parabronchial lymph nodes were moderately enlarged, discrete and firm. The cut surfaces were homogenous and pale red in appearance.

The Heart.

The heart was normal in size. The heart cavities contained "chicken-fat" post mortem clot. The pericardial and endocardial surfaces were uniformly smooth and glistening. The diameter of the right strio-ventricular (tricuspid) valve was 12 cm; of the pulmonary, 7 cm; of the left atrio-ventricular (mitral) valve, 9 cm; of the aortic valve, 7.5 cms. (The valve leaflets were thin and transparent and moved into apposition freely). The thickness of the wall of the left ventricle averaged 1.8 cm. The myocardium presented a uniform firm consistency and appearance. There was no scarring or evidence of recent disease.

The coronary arteries were free from abnormality.

The Aorta was normal, the endocardial surface being pale yellow, smooth with a few fatty streaks in the descending portion.

The Thymus

A small amount of pale reddish thymus tissue remained in the cellular tissues beneath the manubrium of the sternum. This had a soft flabby uniform consistency and blended into the surrounding tissues.

The Liver

The liver was normal in size. The peritoneal surfaces were smooth and shiny. The organ cut easily presenting a firm uniform consistency. The cut surfaces were reddish brown and the fine mottling of the liver lobules was easily seen. The vessels were normal.

The Gall Bladder

The biliary tract was free from obstruction and bile passed freely from the gall bladder through the ampulla of Vater to the duodenum. The gall bladder was thin-walled and contained a normal quantity of dark-green bile with a syrupy consistency. The mucosa was normal.

The Spleen

The spleen was normal in size and shape. The external surfaces were dark greyish purple. The organ cut easily. The splenic pulp was softer than normal and the tissue scraped away easily on the knife edge. The cut surfaces were dark red mottled with the small greyish white Malpighian corpuscles, which were seen easily.

The Pancreas

This organ was normal in size, shape and position and was firm in consistency. The cut surface produced the normal firm chrome-coloured lobulated appearance of pancreatic tissue. The pancreatic duct was patent.

The Kidneys

These organs were normal in size, shape and position. They were firm in consistency. The capsules stripped easily leaving a smooth shining surface. The organs cut easily. The renal pyramids were prominent. The cortex and medulla were well differentiated. The calyces, pelves and ureters were normal. The renal veins and arteries were normal.

The Suprarenal Glands

These organs were normal in size, shape and position. They were firm and the cut surfaces showed dark red soft medulla surrounded the firm, pale-yellow cortical tissue.

The Stomach

The stomach contained a moderate quantity of yellowish-white opaque fluid material. The mucosa, presented the normal dark creamy colour with normal rugae wrinkling the surface. There were a few scattered petichial haemorrhage beneath the mucosa. There were bright red dots which appeared to be of recent origin.

The Duodenum and Small Bowel

There was no evidence of disease. The mucosa was pale, intact and normal in appearance. The ampulla of Vater was not obstructed.

The Large Bowel

The ileo-caecal valve was normal and not obstructed. The appendix lay free in the ileo-caecal region and showed no evidence of old or recent inflammation. The colon and rectum were normal.

The Bladder

The bladder was not removed. It contained a moderate quantity of clear yellow urine. The wall was thin; the mucosa pale, slightly wrinkled and normal in appearance; the urethral passages were not obstructed. The prostate which was not removed, was firm and normal in size.

The Brain

After fixation the brain was examined and cut. The following gross lesions were found:

1. There was an area of softening and haemorrhage in the posterior portion of the left parietal lobule in the region of the angular gyrus - extending downwards and inwards into grey and white matter and measuring approximately 12x15x25 mm. The portion near the surface was dark red and haemorrhagic, surrounded by a zone of xanthochromic grey softening. Deeper there was minimal haemorrhage but the tissue was xanthochromic and soft.

2. There was a smaller, similar but shallower area of haemorrhage into the grey matter of the median orbital gyrus of the left frontal lobe measuring 9x6x4 mm.

3. Multiple lesions in the right temporal lobe were

examined:

(a) There was a small area of haemorrhage with zone of soft xanthochromia of the surrounding grey matter in the anterior portion of the superior temporal gyrus measuring 10x8x5 mm.

(b) There was a relatively shallow area of haemorrhage similar to the others in the mid portion of the mid-temporal gyrus measuring 20x18x4mm.

(c) There was a deeper more extensive area of softening and haemorrhage in the posterior end of the inferior temporal gyrus, measuring 20x15x15 mm.

(d) There was a small soft yellowish lacerated area at the very tip of the right frontal lobe, measuring 8x8x5 and associated with only minimal amount of haemorrhage.

4. There was a cone-shaped area of gross haemorrhage and softening into the middle portion of the medium orbital gyrus of the right frontal lobe measuring 18x7x15 mm.

5. There was a small area of haemorrhage and associated softening in the angle between the splenium and cingulate gyrus on the right, measuring 5x3x2 mm.

6. There was a yellowing and definite softening of the globus pallidus of the lenticulate nucleus of the left side. The softening encroached on the adjacent portions of the internal capsule.

7. There was very slight flattening in the region of the anterior and posterior central gyri of the left side.

8. There was a compression cone formed by the cerebellum and the medulla. The cut surface of the medulla oblongata appeared yellowish and there were very fine brownish spots (which may have been small vessels.).



FINDINGS OF THE BOARD

Having heard the evidence, the Board is of the opinion:

1. That the rating's death was immediately caused by pneumonia which had set in as a result of an accident on board H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK" on the 8th day of December, 1944, at approximately 1415 local time, when the rating struck his head on the deck of that ship while vaulting across the well deck bulwarks from H.M.C.S. "BATTLEFORD" to H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK".
2. That everything possible was done for this rating, both medically and surgically.
3. That there was evidence that the rating had consumed alcoholic beverage at sometime unknown prior to the accident wherein he struck his head, although the evidence does not support a finding of the quantity of the beverage consumed nor to what degree the consumption affected his sobriety.
4. That the rating's death was attributable to Naval Service as such in as much as the accident which resulted directly in his death was received on board H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK" while the rating was on active duty.

Evidence of Lieutenant John Foggo Carmichael, R.C.N.R.
(Temp.), Official Number O-12240, Called and Cautioned.

1. Q. Are you Captain of H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK"?
A. I am, sir.
2. Q. Can you tell me what you know of the circumstances surrounding the accident to one, Stoker Petty Officer Madden?
A. I have only hearsay evidence from my own investigation.
3. Q. You did not see the accident yourself?
A. No, sir.
4. Q. Did you see Leading Stoker Madden after the accident?
A. No, I did not. I was at a conference and I did not know about it until I got back.
5. Q. Did you take any action?
A. It was quite late at night and he had already gone to hospital, and it was not until the following day that I had inquiries made.
6. Q. Do you know if the Officer of the Watch or the First Lieutenant reported the circumstances of the accident to the hospital?
A. Well, the Sick Berth Attendant reported it to the Officer of the Day - and this is all from my own inquiry you must remember.
7. Q. Well you see, what the board wants to know is if the hospital knew at the time or shortly after the time of the accident what happened to Madden?
A. I believe they got the doctor down on the ship within ten to fifteen minutes.
8. Q. As far as you know, no formal report was made by the officer of the ship to the hospital of the circumstances of the accident?
A. No, Sir.

Evidence of Owen Olsgard, Able Seaman, Official Number V-10779, Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, Called and Cautioned.

9. Q. Your name is Owen Olsgard, Able Seaman, Official Number V-10779?

A. Yes, sir.

10. Q. Able Seaman Olsgard, this is an inquiry into the death of one, Leading Stoker Madden. Can you tell us anything of this accident to Leading Stoker Madden?

A. Well, only what I saw, sir.

11. Q. Will you tell us what you saw?

A. Well, I saw him coming over - he was aboard H.M. C.S. "BATTLEFORD" - and he was just coming over the bulwarks between the heavy and light depth charge throwers where the scramble net is, and he evidently was going to vault over the side, and evidently his foot caught in something and he rolled over and fell face up on our steel deck, the back of his head hitting first.

12. Q. Where were you when Leading Stoker Madden fell?

A. I was doing up a heaving line of the "BATTLEFORD".

13. Q. What was your position on the upper deck in relation to where Madden fell? Were you on the quarterdeck?

A. I was standing opposite the after depth charges there are on the deck of H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK".

14. Q. Then you were within approximately fifteen feet of where Madden Fell?

A. Yes, sir.

15. Q. What did you do when you saw Madden fall?

A. Well, when I saw him I dropped the line and ran over to him. Well, I looked at him to see if he was unconscious. I got there shortly after he hit the deck, and his eyes were open and he did not speak or move, so I took him by the shoulders and there was another rating came up and took him by the feet and we carried him into the ship and down to the Stokers' Mess with the help of a few more when we were going down the ladder.

16. Q. Did you tell anybody to get the S.B.A.?

A. Yes, sir. I went up on deck then and told the S.B.A. to go down.

Evidence of Owen Olsgard, Able Seaman, Official Number V-10779, R.C.N.V.R., Continued.

17. Q. What time of night did this accident happen?
- A. I cannot be sure, sir. It was shortly after we tied up after slipping from French Cable Wharf.
18. Q. Was it dark or light?
- A. It was light. It was in the afternoon.
19. Q. Had you had supper?
- A. No, we hadn't.
20. Q. It must have been before 1700?
- A. It must have been because we eat at five. I imagine it would be about 2.30 or possibly three o'clock.
21. Q. What time did the ambulance come for him?
- A. I did not see when the ambulance came. I was not on the deck.
22. Q. You described that he fell on the back of his head. Is that right?
- A. When he was coming off the "BATTLEFORD" he was going to vault over. As he jumped he twisted in the air and he fell on H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK's" deck. He twisted around the natural twist to take off.
23. Q. How far a fall is it?
- A. Approximately 3½ feet.
24. Q. Was there any other way to get to the ship next alongside, H.M.C.S. "BATTLEFORD"?
- A. No, at that time there was no other means of crossing it, sir.
25. Q. H.M.C.S. "BATTLEFORD" had just come alongside you?
- A. Yes. About five minutes.
26. Q. Is that quite usual that you hop over close to the depth charges?
- A. We usually have a little space to step over.
27. Q. Who was the other person who helped you pick up Madden?
- A. I just don't remember, sir. There was this rating came up and we carried him, and a couple of other ratings at the time, I don't know.

28. Q. Did you see him previously?

A. No, I didn't. I was on the quarterdeck.

29. Q. Did you know from your own personal knowledge that he had been drinking?

A. No, I did not, sir.

30. Q. When the S.B.A. came did you tell him what had happened, how you saw him fall?

A. No. When I left the Stoker's Mess I did not go below again.

31. Q. Tell us where you carried him.

A. We carried him to the Stokers' Mess.

32. Q. You were the person who actually informed the S.B.A.?

A. Yes. There was a couple of lads yelling around. I walked up to the Number 6 Mess.

33. Q. What did you tell the S.B.A.?

A. I told him one of the lads was hurt down below.

34. Q. But nothing further?

A. No, sir.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, Called and Cautioned.

35. Q. Are you Sick Berth Attendant on H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK"?

A. Yes, sir.

36. Q. Did you attend Leading Stoker Madden when he was injured on board H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK"?

A. Yes, sir.

37. Q. Approximately what time of day was it?

A. Approximately three o'clock, sir.

38. Q. When you were told about it?

A. I was told about a quarter past three.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, R.C.N.V.R., Continued.

39. Q. Do you know the date?

A. 8th December, 1944.

40. Q. Who told you that Leading Stoker Madden was injured?

A. I do not remember who it was. Someone came up out of the Stokers' Mess and said "Your presence is required in the Stokers' Mess".

41. Q. What did you then do?

A. I went down to the Stokers' Mess.

42. Q. What did you find there?

A. I found Madden. He was on a lower bunk on the starboard side and was unconscious. I moved him from the bunk with the help of Jack Hughes, Leading Stoker, moved him over to the cushions on the lockers. It was lighter there. You could not see on the lower bunk. I examined him, looked at the pupils of his eyes and there was no evidence of concussion there that I could see, and I went up and got a bottle of spirits of ammonia and came down and gave him that. There was no reaction at all. He just rolled his head over on the other side. I went to inform the M.O. and 'phoned him up and told him to come down.

43. Q. Which M.O.?

A. I do not know the name. He was on duty that day in the "SCOTIAN" Sick Bay.

44. Q. Did he come down to the ship?

A. Yes, sir. There was one more thing I noticed on Madden there, before I 'phoned. I looked up

45. Q. Madden's nose and found evidence of a bloody discharge there. The blood had congealed inside his nose and that was the thing that made me think it was a serious case, so I informed the M.O. right away.

45. Q. How late was it before the M.O. got there?

A. Between five and ten minutes.

46. Q. What happened after the M.O. arrived?

A. We both went down to the Stokers' Mess and he examined Madden and he said he had better take him up to ~~H.M.C.S. "STADACONA"~~ Sick Bay.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, R.C.N.V.R., Continued.

47. Q. Did you go with him?
A. No, sir. I went as far as the ship. There was a pay muster and I was in line for pay.
48. Q. The last you saw of Madden was when the doctor said "We'll take him to Sick Bay"?
A. Yes, sir. At that time he was on his feet. He was conscious. He was arguing with the M.O. He did not want to go to hospital.
49. Q. When did he regain consciousness?
A. Just as he was leaving the ship.
50. Q. Was he on a stretcher?
A. No, sir. The easiest way to get him up was to carry him up.
51. Q. How did he carry him up?
A. In his arms. Sideways.
52. Q. Was it when he got up on deck that he regained consciousness?
A. He was just coming out of the waist, just about in line with the forward thrower and he started to come to.
53. Q. Did he walk over to the ambulance?
A. He was helped across the ships.
54. Q. Do you know if he was duty watch at the time of the accident?
A. No, sir.
55. Q. Do you know if he had been drinking?
A. He had his tot at noon. That is all I know.
56. Q. Did you tell the M.O. when he came on board the history of the accident, when it happened and that he had fallen on his head?
A. All I knew was what I was told myself.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, R.C.N.V.R., Continued.

57. Q. What was that?

A. I was told he was coming over the rail and slipped at the rail and fell on his head.

58. Q. And did you tell that to the M.O.?

A. Yes, sir.

59. Q. You are quite sure of that?

A. Yes, sir. I showed him the bump on his head.

60. Q. Where was this bump?

A. On the left side, top and back.

61. Q. Will you indicate on your head?

(Indicated a bump over the left parieto-occipital.)

62. Q. You definitely indicated that bump to the M.O.?

A. There was a little redness there as though it had been abraded.

63. Q. Did you have any further dealings to do with the man after he was once removed from your ship?

A. No, sir.

64. Q. You did not see him again at all?

A. No. He went straight to the sick bay and after that it was just what I was told at the sick bay.

65. Q. Is it among your duties to make a written report or verbal report to your officers or see if it is put in the ship's Log?

A. Yes, sir. I reported it to the Officer of the Day.

66. Q. The Officer of the Day was not present at the time?

A. I went to see the First Lieutenant. He was ashore on some duty. I saw Sub-Lieutenant Davies and told him about it.

67. Q. Did you make any note to that effect?

A. I made an entry in my daily journal which I have on board, to the effect that he had slipped and fallen and I had called the M.O.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, R.C.N.V.R., Continued.

68. Q. When you first saw Madden did you realize he was unconscious. The first time you saw Madden in the Stokers' Mess deck.

A. Yes, sir.

69. Q. Did you ever receive any instructions in your training as S.B.A. telling you that an unconscious person should not be moved until seen by a doctor?

A. He had already been moved. I had had instruction.

70. Q. He had been moved to the Stokers' Mess deck.

But you had him moved from the bunk to the cushions on the lockers?

A. Yes, sir.

71. Q. Did you examine him at all before you moved him?

A. No, sir. It was too dark to there.

72. Q. Did you have a flashlight in your kit?

A. Yes, I had a flashlight.

73. Q. You were satisfied that the patient could be moved from the bunk to a place where you could adequately examine him?

A. Yes, sir.

Evidence of Acting Surgeon Lieutenant Commander Walter Gowans Rice, R.C.N.V.R.(Temp.), Official Number O-61900, Called and Cautioned.

74. Q. You performed the official autopsy on one Leading Stoker Madden?

A. Yes.

75. Q. On what date did you perform this autopsy?

A. On the morning of 17th December, 1944.

76. Q. Did you come to any conclusions as to the cause of death?

A. The immediate cause of death was an acute bronchial pneumonia involving the larger portions of both lungs, particularly the right lung. The only other abnormality we discovered was in his brain where he had had a trephine on the left side.

Evidence of Acting Surgeon Lieutenant Commander
Walter Gowans Rice, R.C.N.V.R.(Temp.), Official
Number O-61900, Continued.

76. A. (continued) When we removed the top of the skull we could see that there had been a haemorrhage between the dura and the bone of the skull. Most of this clot had been removed but there was some remaining. We then opened into the dura of the brain and removed the brain and the brain was fixed before we examined it. We examined after the fixation. The brain itself presented extensive damage. Besides the haemorrhage I previously described, there were small areas of haemorrhage averaging in size from an acorn to a walnut in the brain tissue on the opposite side. The majority of the haemorrhages were in the temporal lobe on the right side. There were also smaller areas of haemorrhage into the frontal lobes of both sides and into the parietal of the left side and the only further finding was evidence of pressure, that is, the medulla and the cerebellum which are at the base of the brain, had been forced into the foramen magnum to form a slight cone.
77. Q. Have you a copy of the autopsy, doctor?
A. Yes, I have.
78. Q. Is that a copy of the autopsy?
A. Yes, complete except that microscopic findings are not here yet.
79. Q. Doctor, from what you found in the post mortem of the haemorrhages in the cerebrum could you tell how severe a blow he had received?
A. I would say it must have been a very severe blow. I could not measure the blow. There was no fracture of the skull.
80. Q. Was there any surgical treatment given?
A. There was an opening to the skull to remove the clot.
81. Q. Do you know when that operation was performed?
A. Approximately 6 or 7 days before.
82. Q. Can you tell us from the post mortem you carried out if the deceased received a severe blow and surgical treatment was not carried out for 48 hours or so, would that definitely contribute to his susceptibility to contract pneumonia?

Evidence of Acting Surgeon Lieutenant Commander
Walter Gowans Rice, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official
Number O-61900, Continued.

82. A. In this case I think that no matter what treatment he received, I consider he would die anyway.
83. Q. What from?
- A. From these haemorrhages into the brain tissue.
84. Q. Yet in your findings and report you have stated the primary cause was pneumonia?
- A. That was the immediate cause of death but if he had escaped this he would have died anyway.
85. Q. That is your opinion as a specialist?
- A. Yes.
86. Q. Would the microscopic report assist the Board in any way or are you merely waiting for it for a professional interest?
- A. The microscopic report is only of interest professionally and would not make any difference to the findings.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Lloyd Russell Schram,
R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-65354, Called
and Cautioned.

87. Q. Were you Duty M.O. in the H.M.C.S. "SCOTIAN" Sick Bay on the 8th December, 1944?
- A. Yes, sir.
88. Q. Were you called to H.M.C.S. "KAMSACK" on this date?
- A. Yes.
89. Q. When you got there did you see Leading Stoker Madden?
- A. Yes.
90. Q. Where was he in the ship when you saw him?
- A. He was in the Stokers' Mess Deck.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Lloyd Russell Schram,
R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.) Official Number O-65354, Continued.

91. Q. What was his condition when you saw him?

A. He was semi-conscious, we were able to rouse him by speaking to him and that is about all. Do you want the physical examination too?

92. Q. As completely as you can.

A. Well, I went over him and at the time I examined him he had a large swelling on the back of the left side of his head, his pupils were equal, and his reflexes were normal. He felt more or less cold and there was a little bit of bleeding from his left nostril. That was old blood. He smelled very strongly of liquor. The conclusions were first of all, possible intoxication, and secondly, skull fracture.

93. Q. You said in the last question "possible intoxication". Was there evidence that this rating, Madden, had been drinking?

A. Yes.

94. Q. What was this evidence?

A. Well, as far as my part was concerned myself, the odor of the liquor on his breath, which was quite pronounced.

95. Q. From whom, and what did you hear of this rating, how he had been injured?

A. The report was received from the Sick Berth Attendant and from others there that the patient came on board and was seen to be reeling at the time and he slipped and fell on the deck and bumped his head and that he was carried down to the Stokers' Mess.

96. Q. In what position was he in the Stokers' Mess when you saw him?

A. He was lying out on one of the lockers.

97. Q. What conclusion did you reach and how serious did you think it was at that time?

A. I thought the patient to have two possible diagnoses. First, intoxication, and second, skull fracture, and accordingly I ordered an ambulance to take him to R.C.N. Hospital.

98. Q. Is that the last you saw of the patient?

A. I accompanied him to the Sick Bay and subsequently to R.C.N. Hospital.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Lloyd Russell Schram,
R.C.N.V.R.(Temp.) Official Number O-65354. Continued.

99. Q. Did he regain full consciousness?
- A. He was able to talk and asked to smoke and we wouldn't allow him to smoke.
100. Q. Did he talk coherently in the ambulance?
- A. No, not coherently. Not sensibly. In fact he got away from us and we had to get him into the ambulance as best we could. We had to lift him in.
101. Q. Did he argue about going to hospital?
- A. Yes, we couldn't get him in at all. He was coherent in one sense, but was not talking sense.
102. Q. He understood what you intended to do with him? And he objected?
- A. Yes.
103. Q. Did you attribute these nonsensical statements to the blow he had received on his head or his state of intoxication?
- Q. Actually, I personally thought it was largely intoxication, but there was a chance of a skull fracture and that is why I sent for the ambulance, in the possibility of a skull fracture.
104. Q. Did anything else of importance happen between the time you took him from the ship and the time you got him to hospital?
- A. The rating was carried up to the upper deck and taken to the ambulance, and while they were attempting to do that he got away from them and they had to chase him over the ship before they could catch him again.
105. Q. Was he bleeding from the left nostril at that time?
- A. No.
106. Q. Have you anything further to add?
- A. I was told by the S.B.A. and by the patient himself that the bump on his head had been present for several months and dated from a previous injury, but I did not believe it. It looked recent to me.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert Bradshaw McKenzie, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-49670, Called and Cautioned.

107. Q. Surgeon Lieutenant McKenzie will you tell the Board what you know of the death of one, Leading Stoker William Patrick Madden, Official Number V-22713?

A. I first saw Leading Stoker Maden at 0900 on the morning of December 9th, 1944; I was asked to see him by the Surgical Consultant and I examined him and found him lying in the bed unconscious. He was breathing moderately deeply and had a moderate amount of mucus in his pharynx. He could be made to move by painful stimulation. For example, pressure above the eyes, but he did not move his right arm or leg in response to this. However, by stimulation of the right arm and leg by a pin, he did move them to a slight degree. I could find no evidence of lacerations or bruises on the head and skin anywhere. There was a slight amount of dried blood in both nostrils. The examination of the left ear showed the drum to be bluish in colour, and the small vessels injected. Throat could not be examined because the jaws were clenched. Examination of the chest revealed the lungs to be clear.

Neurological Examination: Fundi - both disks were visualized on the right side, the nasal margin of the disc was blurred, the temporal margin was clear and well defined. There was moderate engorgement of the veins but no definite papilloedema. The retinae were clear. The pupils were medium in size, slightly and equal. There was very slight reaction to light on the left side and no reaction whatever on the right side. There were definite dissociated eye movements with horizon roving of both eyes; no definite ocular palsies were noted. The remaining cranial senses did not reveal any abnormalities.

Reflexes: Corneal reflexes present. Reflexes of arms present and equal. Abdominal and crames-
teric reflexes absent. The right hand jerk was accentuated, the right ankle jerk was absent, and there was a bilateral Babinski reflex and bilateral Chaddock Gordon and Oppenheim reflexes. There was a grasp reflex present on the right side. No loss of sensation was discovered. There was some spacticity of the right arm and leg, but this was inconstant, movements in response to painful stimuli were minimal on the right side.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert Bradshaw McKenzie, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-49670, Continued.

T There were frequent attacks of spasm in extension of both lower extremities and the right arm, mostly in response to stimuli. This was suggestive of early decerebrate rigidity. Patient was incontinent. There was no definite evidence of external injury.

In view of these findings, on consultation with Surgeon Commander W. C. McKenzie, it was decided that the Medical Consultant, Surgeon Lieutenant-Commander L. N. Ross, should be asked to see the case.

108. Q. This all took place on the morning of the 9th December?

A. Yes. When this consultation took place it was decided that in view of the lack of adequate history, the fact that the patient, although reported to be a Naval rating had a moustache, had his identification card in an Air Force holder, and the lack of any conclusive localizing signs, that the case would bear watching and that an attempt would be made to obtain a definite history.

109. Q. What information was given to you when you first saw the patient as to what had happened to him?

A. When I saw the case, the report of the M.O. on duty in the ward the previous afternoon was that the patient had been admitted from Dockyard Sick Bay with a history of having fallen and struck his head, became unconscious, and as far as I understood, remained so until I saw him.

110. Q. Did that report say when he was unconscious, when he first became unconscious?

A. There was no time definitely mentioned. It was mentioned as having occurred during the afternoon of December 8th.

111. Q. Did you presume that he was unconscious from the time on December 8th until you saw him on the morning of the 9th?

A. At that time I did.

112. Q. What steps were taken to obtain a correct history of what had happened to this rating?

A. Following the conclusion of the consultation I telephoned the Petty Officer of the Watch on duty in the Admitting Office and asked him to send an S.B.A. to the ship that this rating was

brought up from and to speak to the Officer of the Day and bring back any witnesses of the accident and also a messmate who had known the rating for some time.

113. Q. Were these witnesses forthcoming?

A. Yes, sir. At approximately 1800 on the afternoon of the 9th the Accident Prevention Officer of H.M.C.S. "STADACONA" came to the hospital, inquiring as to what was wanted of him, and after the situation was explained he immediately went to the ship and brought the witnesses back.

114. Q. Who were these witnesses?

A. One witness is present at this inquiry today.

(Lieutenant McKimmie pointed out Able Seaman Owen E. Olsgard, Official Number V-10779).

115. Q. When you had questioned the witnesses, what further conclusions were you able to reach?

A. Following the questioning of the witnesses there was no doubt that this patient had suffered a severe head injury. They described minutely how he had fallen and landed on the back of his head on the steel deck, his foot having caught as he attempted to vault the rail and threw him over on his back, landing on his head. Another feature of this history was that the rating had fallen at approximately 1415 on the afternoon of December 8th, that he was immediately unconscious and remained so for approximately one hour. At this time the M.O. from the Sick Bay arrived with the ambulance and the rating was carried from his mess to the deck. On reaching fresh air he regained consciousness, stated that he felt all-right, he recognized people by their proper names, and they helped him walk across the inside ship to the jetty. He was taken by ambulance to Sick Bay where he complained of severe pain in the back of his head and lapsed into a semi-comatose state at about 1600 to 1630. He was admitted to hospital at about 1700 at which time he was irrational, restless, and irritable, so much so, that he could not co-operate when X-rays were being taken. Another feature was that he had had no complaints previous to this. He had done some amateur boxing but there was no evidence of previous injury.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert Bradshaw McKenzie, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-49670, Continued.

116. Q. As a result of that report what action did you take?

A. In view of this history and the fact that other examinations had taken place throughout the day, namely, examination of the blood for sugar nitrogen content, X-rays of the skull, all of which did not demonstrate any disease, and the fact that a lumbar puncture revealed moderate increase in pressure and blood present to a moderate degree in the specimens, it was thought that there was no doubt that his symptoms were due to a head injury. It was decided that the patient should be watched very closely for another short period to note any definite change in his general condition which seemed to be more or less stationary at that time. Surgeon Commander McKenzie was notified and saw the patient at approximately 2000.

At 2200 the patient's condition had deteriorated. There were periods of hyperventilation, alternating with periods of shallow breathing, the pupils were still equal, fixed to light, there were dissociated eye movements, there were frequent attacks suggestive of decerebrate rigidity, the pulse rate was increasing up to 140 and more and the temperature was rising. The Surgical Consultant, Surgeon Commander W. C. McKenzie, who saw the patient again at this time, decided that it was advisable to do an exploration because of the progression of the symptoms.

117. Q. What happened after that?

A. Following this the operating room staff was notified that an operation was going to take place, the patient was prepared, his scalp was shaved, and on examination of the head at this time a diffuse ecchymosis was visible over a large portion of the scalp in the parieto-occipital region bilaterally. This was not swollen and on palpation did not differ from the remainder of the scalp. This was the only sign of external injury.

At 0100 on 10th December, 1944, this patient was operated upon and a very large extradural haematoma was evacuated from the left side. Post-operative condition was good and the patient slowly improved until December 13th when he developed a bronchial pneumonia and from that time his condition was progressively worse until he died at 2213 on 16th December, 1944.

118. Q. Was it possible to do anything to arrest this pneumonia condition which arose subsequent to the operation?

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert Bradshaw McKenzie, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-49670,
Continued.

- A. To the best of my knowledge everything possible was done to prevent the development of pneumonia, the patient received excellent nursing care, oxygen continuously and penecillin for two days previous to the development of pneumonia, and all during its course subsequently.
119. Q. If the Medical Officers had had a complete history of the case when this patient had been admitted to R.C.N. Hospital and an operation performed much earlier, do you think it would have made much difference?
- A. I do not think that it would have made any appreciable difference in the final outcome of this case.
120. Q. Do you think all reasonable care, both clinically and surgically, was taken by the Medical branch in caring for this rating?
- A. I do.
121. Q. Who was the Surgeon Lieutenant on duty when this rating was admitted at 1500 on 8th December?
- A. As far as I know, sir, the rating did not reach the ward until approximately 1700 on the 8th. At that time the M.O. in charge of the ward was due to leave and I believe Surgeon Lieutenant Commander Chambers was the Duty M.O. on wards that night.
122. Q. Was he seen by a Medical Officer previous to you seeing him next morning?
- A. Yes, sir. By two Medical Officers.
123. Q. Do you think that this rating's death was attributable to the Naval Service?
- A. Yes, in that this injury was received on duty on board ship, I think his illness and subsequent death was attributable to his Naval Service.
124. Q. At the time you saw the deceased, did you know he had been drinking the day previous?
- A. No, sir.
125. Q. Was there any evidence from your examination of the patient that this patient might have been drinking immediately prior to the injury?
- A. There was no evidence in my examinations.

Evidence of Surgeon Lieutenant Robert Bradshaw McKenzie, R.C.N.V.R. (Temp.), Official Number O-49679, Continued.

126. In the report received, the original report that was not complete, was there any suggestion that the rating's condition might have been due to intoxication?

A. There was a suggestion.

127. Q. Did you not find anything to support this next morning?

A. No, sir.

Evidence of Owen Olsgard, Able Seaman, Official Number V-10779, R.C.N.V.R., Recalled and Cautioned.

128. Q. When you first saw Madden, was there anyone else with him when he was vaulting over the side?

A. No, sir.

129. Q. Were you the only rating in his immediate vicinity, that is, in the starboard well deck?

A. I am not sure, sir.

130. Q. Are you quite sure that you did not know Madden was drinking that day?

A. Yes, sir. I am.

131. Q. You are sure he was not drinking?

A. In my own mind, he was not.

132. Q. And you never told the M.O. or other investigating officer that he was staggering and fell on the deck, and was drinking?

A. No, sir.

133. Q. If another witness came in and stated that he saw him staggering and was drunk and fell on the deck, would that be correct?

A. From my point of view it was not like that. The man appeared sober to me.

Evidence of Murray Jackson Speers, Sick Berth Attendant, Official Number V-34374, Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, Recalled and Cautioned.

134. Q. Did you hear any rating inform the M.O. that came on board to look at Madden that Madden had

been drinking and was staggering on the deck and fell and smashed his head?

A. I did not hear him say that.

135. Q. What did you hear?

A. When the M.O. came down there were a few of the boys there. The doctor smelled his breath and then he said "What has he been drinking?"

136. Q. What answer did the doctor get?

A. Somebody said "A couple of tots".

137. Q. Do you know who that person was?

A. Jack Utes, I believe.

138. Q. Was this Leading Stoker Jack Utes a particular friend of Madden, do you know?

A. Yes. They were pretty good pals.

139. Q. Did you hear anyone at that time tell the M.O. that Madden was one of the heaviest drinkers on the ship?

A. No, I didn't hear that.

140. Q. Can you recall anything else with reference to this, that Leading Stoker Madden had been drinking, been drinking or consuming liquor, in conversation while the doctor was there?

A. I can recall no conversation on that subject, just what I told you. He did say, I think, "A couple of tots".

141. Q. Did you notice the odor of alcohol on Leading Stoker Madden's breath while you were examining him?

A. Yes I did but I did not say anything about it.

The following additional details may help to explain the nature of the enquiries overleaf:

- (2) Every effort should be made to determine whether the deceased had been living ashore prior to joining the ship, and if so, the shore address should be ascertained and enquiry made there in case the deceased had left some personal effects which he had intended to collect later. Any such effects should be collected and disposed of in the usual way.
- (3) a. Uniform and personal effects should be inventoried in triplicate on Form S.46 and articles specified in N.M.O. 922, paragraphs 4 and 5, returned to store. This applies to ratings only.
b. The effects that should be reserved and withheld from sale are, in the case of ratings, Cap Tally, Silks, Lanyard, and any other items which may have been requested by the next-of-kin, providing such request arrives before sale of the remaining articles has taken place. Officers' effects are all reserved.
- (5) Preferential charges as defined by N.M.O. 839, paragraph 6, as follows:
"(i) Expenses of last illness and funeral over and above those borne by the Government of Canada."
"(ii) Service debts, namely sums due in respect of, or of any advance in respect of:
(a) quarters, (b) mess, canteen, band and other service accounts, (c) service clothing, appointments and equipment, not exceeding a sum equal to six months' pay of the deceased, and having become due within eighteen months before his death.
In many cases it may not be practical to ascertain or make such charges.
- (6) If any claims against the estate have been brought to the attention of the Committee, they should be investigated by the Committee as effectively as circumstances may permit. With regard to any such claims mentioned in the Committee of Adjustment's Report, an opinion of their validity and justice is very necessary as a further safeguard against improper claims.

(5) On being enrolled as a member of the REGINA Division of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, I undertake to bind myself:—

(a) To serve from the date thereof for the duration of hostilities, being subject to the provisions of the Naval Service Act, and of the Regulations made in pursuance thereof for the government of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, and to the customs and usages of His Majesty's Canadian Naval Service.

(b) To report for active service if called upon in time of war or emergency, and, if called into active service, to serve ashore or afloat as may be directed, according to where my services are required.

(c) To keep in good repair and condition the articles of uniform and any articles of outfit which may be issued to me and to return them to the nearest Divisional Commanding Officer or to Training Headquarters prior to my discharge or when required so to do by any authorized person, or to pay compensation for any loss or damage thereto other than fair wear and tear; and also not to wear such uniform or outfit (which is and remains the property of the Crown) except when on naval duty.

(d) To undergo vaccination or re-vaccination, or inoculation, as considered necessary by the appropriate authorities.
