HEIFEROLOGY 101

SHIP'S HISTORY:

As I rummaged through the books in my cabin I found a very interesting book named "Ship's History First Canadian Training Division". The following are quotes from this publication:

Royal Canadian Navy: release dated Thursday, 8th November, 1951, PM Edition.

Ottawa---Two new ships for the Royal Canadian Navy will come off the ways, in a dual launching ceremony at the Davies Shipbuilding and Repair Co., Lauzon, Quebec, Monday afternoon, November 12th, Naval Headquarters announced today.

The ships are the first two of fourteen 390-ton minesweepers being built under Canada's more than \$150,000,000 naval shipbuilding program. HMCS Gaspe will be christened by Mrs. Hugh Lapointe, wife of the minister of Veteran Affairs, and an hour later HMCS Cowichan will be christened by Mrs. H.T.W. Grant, wife of the Chief of Naval Staff.

These ship's will combine the most modern living and messing arrangements with the latest navigational and detection equipment. The ships are 152 feet in length and have a beam of 28 feet. Aluminum has been used in the frames and decks while the out hull is wooden. Diesel-powered, the ships will have a speed comparable with that of the Second World War. They will be equipped with the latest navigational radar and minesweeping equipment.

Internally, weight-saving aluminum has contributed much to the comfort and convenience of the living spaces. The mess-decks will be fitted with bunks and foam rubber mattresses. Each of the approximately 35 men in the ship's company will have a roomy, practical aluminum locker. A modified form of cafeteria messing will be installed, supplied by an electrical galley. The ships will be better insulated than most ships built previously, so that they can operate in varied climates.

OUR HERITAGE:

First Cowichan

The first Cowichan was commissioned at Vancouver on July 4, 1941, she sailed from Esquimalt for Halifax on August 6, arriving on September 10. After working up in Bermuda she was initially assigned to the Local Defence Force, but was transferred in January 1942, to Newfoundland Force and in September to the WLEF. With WLEF's division into escort groups in June 1943, Cowichan became a member of EGW-6. She remained with the group until February 1944, when she was ordered to the UK for invasion duties. She left Halifax on February 19 with CARAQUET, MALPEQUE, and VEGREVILLE via the Azores for Plymounth, arriving on March 13. Assigned to the 31st Minesweeping Flotilla, she was present on D-Day. Cowichan returned to Canada late February 1945, but resumed her duties overseas in June. Proceeding home in September she was paid off on October 9th, 1945, and placed in reserve in Shelburne. Sold in 1946 to a New York buyer and converted for mercantile purposes under Greek flag, she still existed in 1956 under her original name.

Second Cowichan

The second Cowichan was built by the Davie Shipbuilding Co., Luazon, she was commissioned on December 10, 1953 and on March 31, 1954 paid off and transferred to the French Navy. She was renamed La Malouine.

Third Cowichan

The third Cowichan was like the second, a Bay Class Minesweeper. She was launched at Yarrows Ltd., Esquimalt, B.C. on February 26, 1957 and commissioned on 12 December of that year. After commissioning she joined the Second Canadian Minesweeping Squadron operating out of Esquimalt.

During her commission the ship was engaged primarily in training men in minesweeping. But she took part in exercises as well, sharing them with other Canadian and United States Ships. In the course of them, she visited ports to the south, such as San Francisco and Long beach, California. She also, of course, cruised in British Columbia waters, calling at ports en route, and going as far north as Alaska.

She was also present at ceremonial occasions. For example, the review of the fleet by HRH Princess Margret and the presentation of colours to the First Batalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, Her Majesty the Queen. the naval ships formated an impressive background for the latter ceremony.

The minesweepers of the Squadron, including Cowichan, were paid off 28 February 1964.

Present Cowichan

I believe the present Cowichan is the third Cowichan; however, I will find out prior to the ships final paying off ceremony in September 1997. All my historical data ends in 1964.



We can't even keep our own PM out of harms way. Look at what happened when an individual was able to walk


right into the PM's home and right up to his bedroom door totally undetected. What's up with that?


















The Demise of The Mad Cow.


